The Positive Action for Children Fund was established in 2010 with an initial commitment of £50 million over 10 years to support programmes focused on preventing HIV transmission from mother-to-child, and to better the health and well being of women and vulnerable children around the globe. Such work is closely aligned with the World Health Organization's vision for addressing the mother-to-child transmission of HIV and works toward achieving the Millennium Development Goals set to reduce child mortality and improve maternal health. (Article) African First Ladies Gather To Discuss HIV/AIDS

On the sidelines of the African Union Summit in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, on Monday, the General Assembly of the Organization of African First Ladies Against HIV/AIDS (OAFLA) gathered to discuss the continent's progress against HIV/AIDS, Walta Info reports. Woizero Azeb Mesfin, First Lady of Ethiopia and Chair of OAFLA, "called on African first ladies to make every effort to reduce HIV/AIDS deaths in women and prevent mother-to-child transmission (MTCT) of the virus" and "said more action is required to prevent the virus, which according to her is the leading cause of death for women" (1/31).

(Article) Major Commitment Made to Dramatically Accelerate the Elimination of Pediatric HIV/AIDS in Zimbabwe

The Elizabeth Glaser Pediatric AIDS Foundation has been awarded the first year of a five-year \$45-million USD grant to accelerate the scale-up of more effective antiretroviral regimens to reduce HIV transmission from mother- to-child in Zimbabwe and to ensure that HIV positive mothers can access treatment for their own health. The new partnership between the Children's Investment Fund Foundation and the Elizabeth Glaser Pediatric AIDS Foundation also aims to ensure that the lessons learned from Zimbabwe will be used to implement similar programs in other high burden countries, and to strengthen efforts to eliminate pediatric HIV/AIDS globally. A separate, additional award has been made by CIFF to independently monitor and evaluate the impact of the Zimbabwe program.

(Resource) UNAIDS on PMTCT

UNAIDS strategy goal by 2015: Vertical transmission of HIV eliminated and AIDS-related maternal mortality reduced by half. The virtual elimination of mother-to-child transmission is possible by 2015. Significant progress has been made in the past decade. Infection rates among children born to mothers living with HIV have declined by 26% from 2001 to 2009. However, much more needs to be done to prevent mothers from dying and babies from becoming infected with HIV. HIV is the leading cause of mortality in women of reproductive age. Without intervention about one in three children born to HIV-infected mothers will be infected. UNAIDS calls for scaling up access to and the use of quality regimens and services for the prevention of mother-to-child HIV transmission, ensuring mothers have continued access to HIV treatment, and scaling up access to sexual and reproductive health services and reproductive rights for women and their partners.
